





What you *can't* do as a 501c3...



- · Endorse or support candidates for elected office
- Partisan activity


That might look like:

- A campaign fundraiser to support your sena
- Paying for registration for a partisan event
- Letting a mayoral candidate use your office for a campaign event






But what about as an individual?



Consider:


- Is this paid time or am I on personal time?
- Am I using 501c3 organization resources, like event space or money?
- Am I representing myself as an agent of the organization? What contact information am I using?





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What is advocacy?





Washington State Reporting Threshold



Direct lobbying

Anyone who is paid for attempting to influence legislation (including by being reimbursed for any expenses) and has attempted to influence legislation in more than four days in any consecutive three-month period, will trigger lobbyist registration.

Even small amounts of lobbying (e.g., sending one e-mail) can count as one of the four days. Preparation, travel and wait time do not count towards the four-day threshold.

IMPORTANT NOTE: The PDC interprets the four-day threshold as applying to your organization as a whole, and not to individual staff members. For example, if two staff members attend one meeting with a legislator during one day that would count as two days towards the four-day threshold.



Our mission is to stabilize lives, equip people to meet their goals, and build a stronger, more equitable Skagit County.

Equity Statement:

- We are guided by those we serve in our community.
- We believe that all of us can change values, beliefs, and policies to create a more equitable community.
- We recognize that the roots of poverty are embedded in trauma, oppression, and inequity.
- We support and encourage diverse leadership and representation.
- We have a lot to learn by listening to people with this lived experience in poverty, homelessness, and inequity based on race and other identities.





Development of Advocacy Strategy

- Board makeup:
 - ✤ 1/3 public sector (elected), 1/3 private sector, 1/3 client sector
- Public policy advocacy was hoc for many years
- Started doing annual "Take Action!" Olympia bus trip in 2013
 - Staff-driven, board supported
- Participated in statewide coalitions, provided testimony
- Board chartered CREAT subcommittee in 2018
 - "Community Relationships, Education, & Advocacy Taskforce
 - Focus on long-term relationship-building, not just policy/budget wins
 - Monthly meetings with local, state and federal electeds, and other leaders
- Engaged our Skagit Latinx Advisory Committee
 - Public Policy Listening Sessions
 - Candidate forums, listening sessions
 - With ACH and Skagit Public Health: Skagit Latinx COVID Prevention Team

Advocacy in Action



Advocacy is a work in progress. We started out with workshops on Ageism and Being your Own Health Advocate. Collaborative work with *Changing the Narrative*. We participated in Candidate Forums multiple years.

Our current plan is starting with Coffee & Chats with our elected officials – local and state representatives; quarterly newsletter; invitations to participate and/or volunteer at special events; and quarterly advocacy committee meetings.

Participate in community legislative activities – two large cities in Snohomish County – Everett and Lynnwood hosted State of the City events. They give the bigger picture of the upcoming year and beyond.

Started attending other community invitations. Our local Economic Alliance of Snohomish County did a legislative kick off event. Multiple legislative representatives spoke to the upcoming session and took questions from the audience.
